This is a summary of how our school delivers music education to all our pupils across three areas – curriculum music, co-curricular provision and musical experiences – and what changes we are planning in future years. This information is to help pupils and parents or carers understand what our school offers and who we work with to support our pupils' music education.

## Part A: Curriculum music

This is about what we teach in lesson time, how much time is spent teaching music and any music qualifications or awards that pupils can achieve.

- We have taken into consideration the model music curriculum recommendations (2021) and ensure pupils in Key Stage 1 and 2 are taught music 1 hour per week or equivalent. Staff work together to ensure music progression is evident

throughout the school and pupils build on what they have been taught in previous years.

- Music is taught as a part of continuous provision and as discrete lessons in Reception. Music is interwoven into daily routines and children have the opportunity to explore music in continuous provision areas, both indoors and outdoors.
- Children in Years 2 and 3 spend a term learning recorder as a whole-class ensemble. This is taught by class teachers using the Charanga scheme.
- Children in Year 4 spend a term learning ukulele as a whole-class ensemble. This is taught by class teachers using the Charanga scheme.
- Musical Partnership North offers a half day music workshop for children in year
  1.
- Music Partnership North offers the opportunity for children in Reception to take part in a music workshop (30 minute sessions for 6 weeks). This leads to an end of workshop performance.
- Music Partnership North offers the opportunity for children in year 3 to take part in a ceilidh music workshop (30 minute sessions for 6 weeks).
- Children have the opportunity to sing within lessons and in our weekly singing assembly.
- **SEND-** We will strive to remove barriers to learning for pupils with SEND. Adopting a positive and proactive approach will ensure that children with SEND are able to express themselves and take an active part in lessons. Explicit instructions and scaffolding, including 1.1 support will enable all pupils to achieve and succeed in music.

# Part B: Co-curricular music

This is about opportunities for pupils to sing and play music, outside of lesson time, including choirs, ensembles and bands, and how pupils can make progress in music beyond the core curriculum.

• At Havannah First School, we currently offer small-group tuition for children in Year 2 to Year 4 through Music Partnership North. This includes keyboard, violin and guitar tuition. Peripatetic teachers visit the school and teach children in our dedicated music practise room.

Small group lessons offered by Music Partnership North are funded by parents, however for those children who are Pupil Premium, these lessons can be funded by the Pupil Premium provision.

• Nina Bigg (HLTA), leads a lunchtime recorder club for children in Key Stage 2. The children have regular opportunities to perform during whole school assemblies.

• We offer an extracurricular musical theatre club for Key Stage 2, led by the school Music Lead. The choir has the opportunity to perform to a wider audience in the local community during the year.

School based extra curriculum activities are offered to all children without additional costs.

- Our children in Key Stage 2 have opportunities throughout the year to perform songs at a local care home.
- We work closely with Musical Partnership North to ensure we can offer the best possible music opportunities for our children. They offer the opportunity for children to take part in school and regional ensemble events outside of school.

# Part C: Musical experiences

This is about all the other musical events and opportunities that we organise, such as singing in assembly, concerts and shows, and trips to professional concerts.

- Each year group performs in assemblies for parents and carers.
- Each year group takes part in a Christmas nativity/performance for parents and carers, as well as a whole school carol concert using the outdoor stage.
- Reception and Year 3 perform to an audience in school at the end of their 6 week workshop, organised by Music Partnership North.
- Musical Theatre club will have the opportunity to perform at the Glasshouse International Centre for Music as part of massed choir. This event is conducted by the school Music Lead.
- Year 4 have the opportunity to perform a Harvest and Leavers assembly for parents and carers. They will also perform with other schools from across the region as part of 'The Big Gig' organised by Music Partnership North.

Music is incorporated into a variety of activities and events within school, such as weekly assemblies, singing assemblies and classroom routines.

# In the future

This is about what the school is planning for subsequent years.

- Pupil Premium update the register of Pupil Premium children engaged in extracurricular music activities; ensure equality of provision for children who cannot afford to access paid-for provision. Further develop engagement in extracurricular music for Pupil Premium and SEND children.
- CPD- plan CPD for classroom teachers to increase confidence in the delivery of the Charanga Scheme of work.
- Regional ensembles build uptake of instrumental tuition/ sign post children and parents to musical activities outside of school organised Music Partnership North.

- Develop the use of Music technology, such as 'Garage Band' to provide opportunities for children in Key Stage 2 to develop high quality music and enhance composition skills.
- Develop opportunities for children across school to hear and see live musical performances across the year.
